

## Desert Locust Update - South Sudan



## **Situation update**

- Scattered swarmlets of locusts were seen in **Torit**, **Magwi** and **Ikwoto counties**, in Eastern Equatoria, coming from Northern Uganda.
- Specific areas invaded include: Lobone, Lamariti, Ketire, and Obbo
- The damages are minimal mainly vegetable farms, range land and fruit trees while the level of threat for South Sudan is high, especially when the next generation of Desert Locusts will mature.
- The biggest swarm has so far been spotted on February 27 in **Lobone village**, Obbo payam, but it moved

## **FAO** in Response

- FAO has organized a surge team to specifically handle the outbreak.
- On March 3, FAO started the second three-day training on surveillance, control and management of locusts in Kapoeta for 35 staff from FAO, the government, and implementing partners who received equipment and inputs.
- FAO delivered equipment and pesticides (*Malathion*) to Magwi and Torit for desert locust control operations.
- FAO is working alongside the government to build a network of field monitors, and availed four motorbikes to facilitate movement.
- FAO has released two free multi-lingual tools eLocust3m (bit.ly/39ed11j) and DLwatch (tiny.cc/DLwatch) to improve Desert Locust survey and control reporting, share GPS locations of infestations, exchange chat, data, photos, and other relevant information.
- FAO developed a six-month contingency plan for control, management and reduction of locusts' movements. As part of the plan, Desert Locust Control Operations for Eastern Africa (DLCO-EA), is carrying out aerial control operations in Kenya or Ethiopia.
- The government has granted clearance until August 2020 for over flight, landing and exit of one aircraft operated by DLCO-EA for aerial spraying.

## **Funding appeal**

- The South Sudan component of the FAO locust rapid response and anticipatory action has been revised to USD 10 million.
- FAO funds raised to date are USD 3.55 million through internal funds, USAID, the European Union, Germany and the Bill and Melina Gates Foundation.
